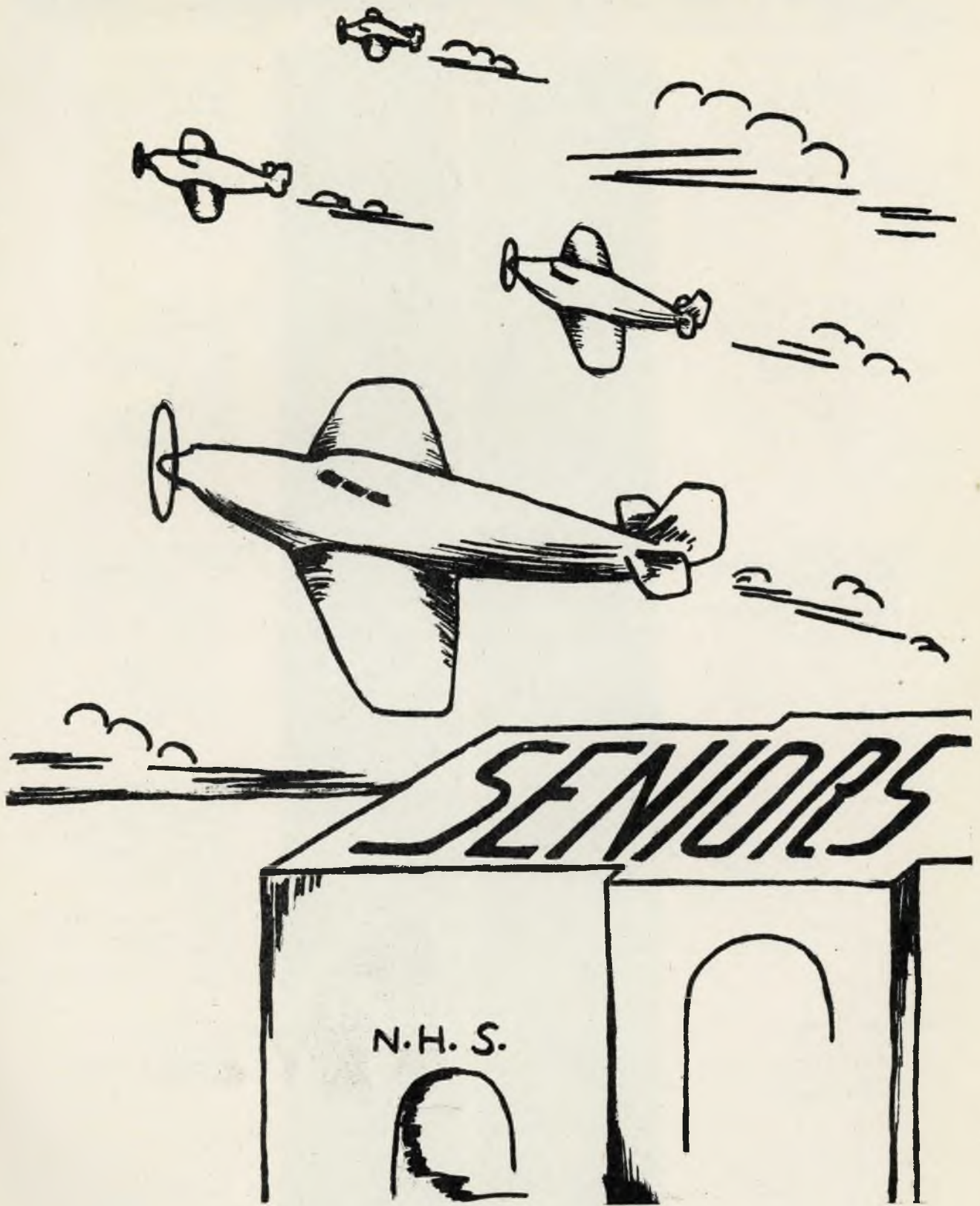

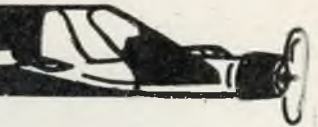

SENIOR ANNALS



In September, 1940, sixty five air minded students took off for a tour of Northville High School, with little idea of what was in store for them, but their curiosity and ambition urged them on. Realizing that this tour was one of the most important in their lives, they vowed to be a faithful and loyal crew. Let's go back and review the four major Flights in this mission and see what the class of "44" has done.

Puzzled and uncertain, they started their basic training as Freshmen. Their new status was recognized early in the fall when the Sophomores entertained them at a party in the gym. The only school function in which they assumed actual responsibility was the N. Club Carnival, where they sponsored a penny pitching booth. They did well in this Carnival and gained confidence in their ability. Many attended the Friday night dances for the first time. They experienced the loyalty of cheering the school team on to Victory.

In September, 1941, they took off on their second or Sophomore Flight. In the fall they realized their advanced rating when they became hosts to the Freshmen who replaced them. In the spring they learned the meaning and real value of class cooperation by sponsoring a dance of their own. For such flying they were guided by their Sponsors Miss Lowe and Mr. Pink. As June of their Sophomore year arrived they completed their under class training and commissioned Robert MacDonald as President, Carolyn Siclovan as Vice President, Thelma Trapp as Secretary, and Gladys Bedore as Treasurer for their first year of their upper class flight.

Now they have reached the halfway mark, their basic training is over, and the tougher assignments begin. Before they entered their Junior Flight the war had become much more serious, and they knew that many of their school plans and dreams would never be accomplished. Little did they realize that they would become war orphans, but they were determined to go ahead and do the best they could. In their Junior Flight they gave their Junior Play, "Special Delivery," which was fun for all. This turned out very successful. They also sold magazines for the Crowell Publishing Company. Each student worked hard and accomplished a great deal. The magazines brought in \$307.68 to add to the class treasury. With a good amount of money in the treasury they wanted to do something worth while with it as there would be no Washington trip for them. They decided to buy a Plaque for the names of all the Northville Servicemen who at one time attended or graduated from Northville High School. They worked hard and saved all the money they could get. Today you can see the Plaque on the wall of the Senior Assembly;



it's a Plaque the class of "44" will always be proud of. They are continuing to add names of other boys who have left, and are hoping that when they leave Northville High School the Junior Class will continue where they left off.

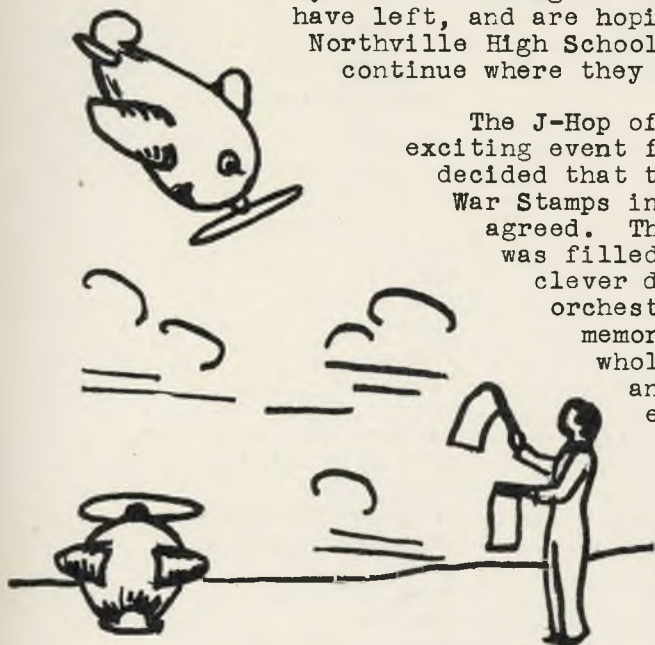
The J-Hop of the Junior Flight was an exciting event for all of them. It was decided that the corsages would be made of War Stamps instead of flowers and everyone agreed. The night of the Hop, the gym was filled almost to capacity and with clever decoration and Max Gail's orchestra, everyone enjoyed a memorable evening. Throughout the whole year they bought war bonds and stamps which they, as everyone else will continue to do until Victory is ours.

September, 1943, marked the beginning of their last flight. Everyone was eager for Graduation day to arrive although they regretted that so many of their members were called to help Uncle Sam, but they are proud of those boys

and hope to see them all back soon. The main activity of this flight was the Senior Prom, trying there best to relieve the minds of the people from war, they all agreed on a Plantation Theme, with colorful decorations and Gene Fenby's excellent Orchestra they made another three point landing.

During the year they sold Potato Chips and Pretzels, adding to the treasury and this money will pay for more names on the Plaque which they started. Their War Bond and Stamp sales amounted to \$5137.75.

Now the tour of Northville High ends and each member of the crew will start on a new adventurous Flight into the world for himself. They will meet many tough situations but they will be able to overcome their difficulties and continue on the road to success.

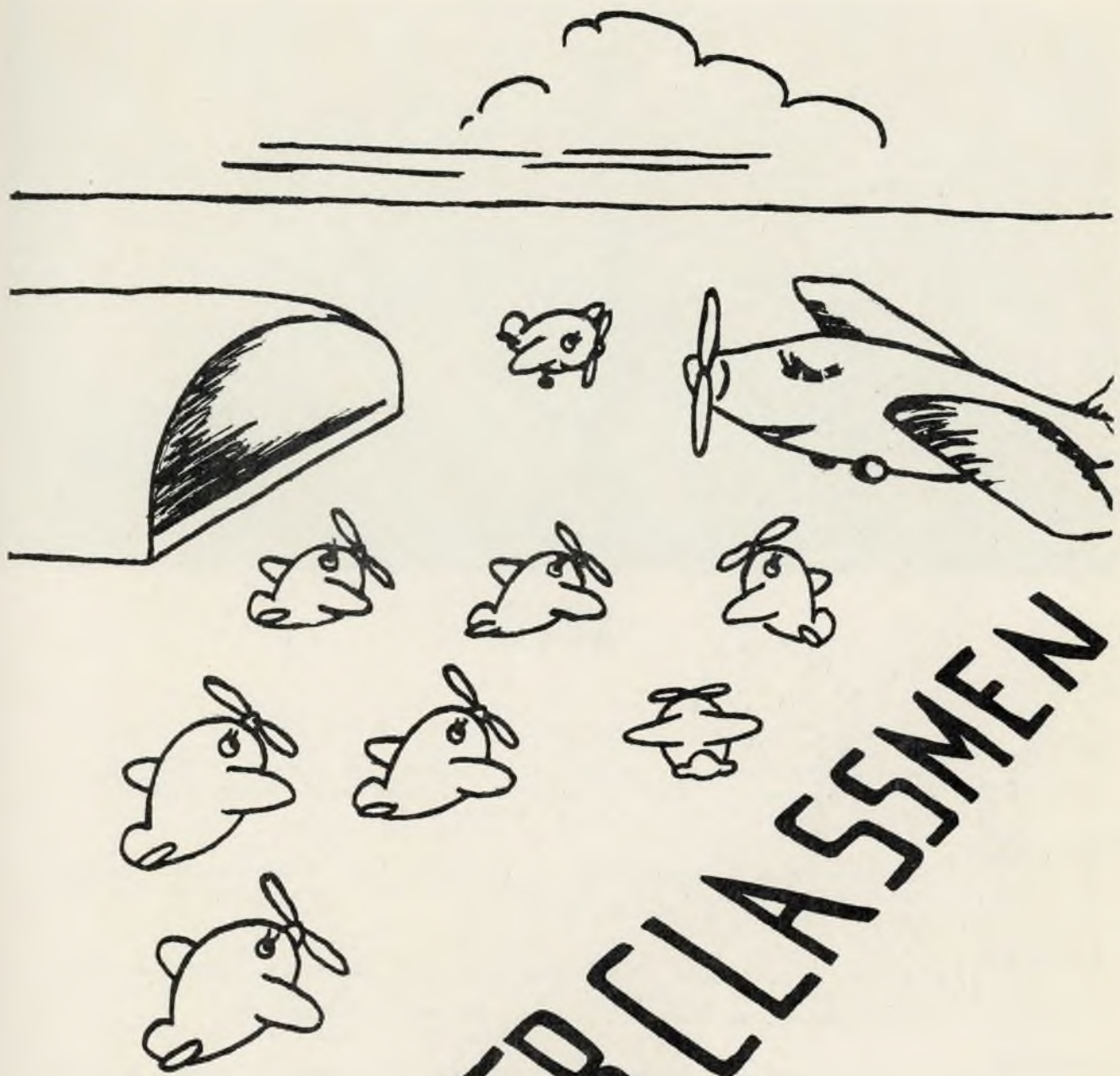

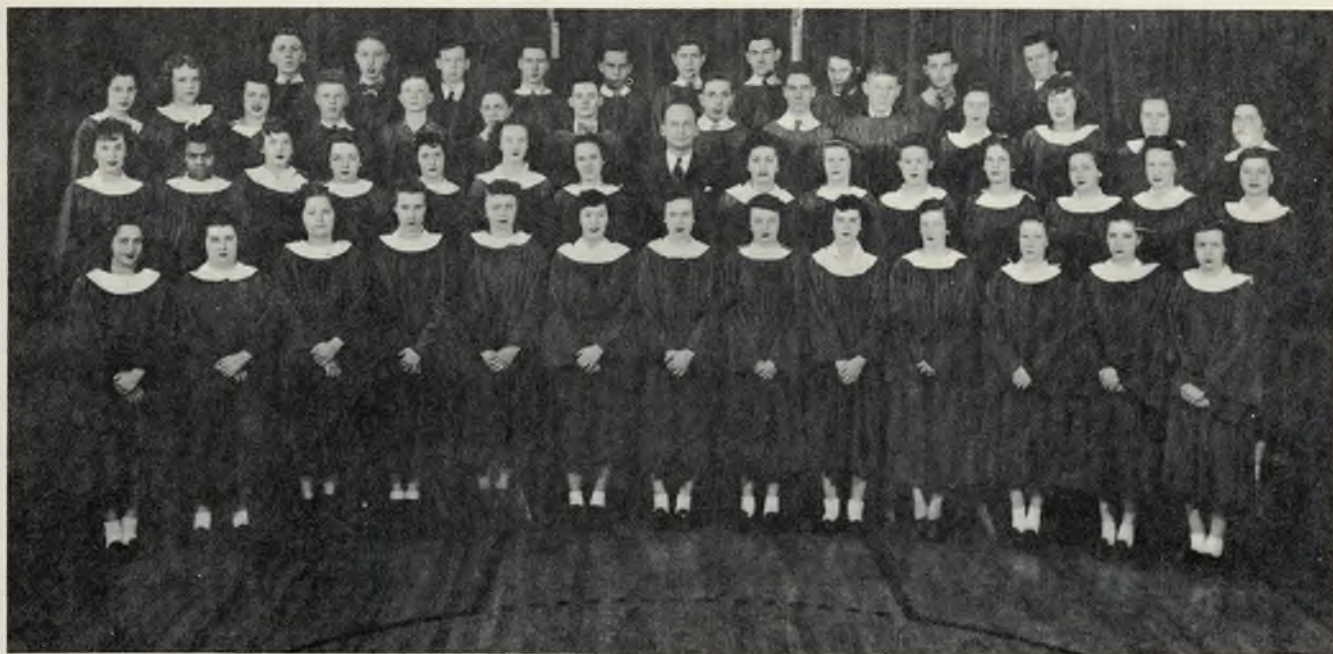
The balance of instruments is well proportioned and each section has reached a high level of playing ability. There are only two seniors in the band at present, so next year's band should be even larger.

MUSTANG

Through the sale of War Bonds the Northville Schools were able to have their name on a P-51 Mustang Pursuit Plane. The plane itself cost \$75,000 and the school purchased only \$51,000 in War Bonds, but they were promised this reward for reaching the \$50,000 goal. The community more than provided the balance. The P-51 Mustang is one of the Army Air Force high altitude fighters. It is the fastest plane in the world at any altitude.

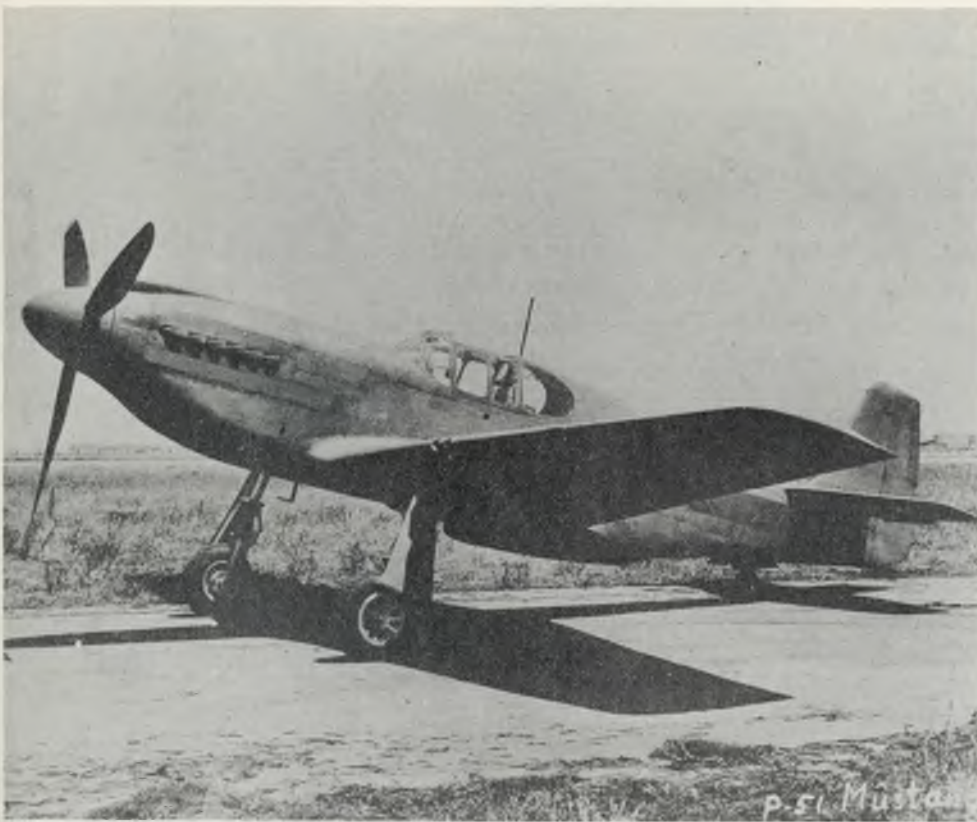
The P-51 has a wing spread of 37 feet, a length of 32 feet, height of 8 feet 8 inches and weighs 8,600 pounds. It is an all metal, low-winged monoplane, and has fully retractable landing gear and steerable tail wheel. Other details of the P-51 Mustang are restricted.

Receiving the Minute Man Flag was another thrilling moment in the history of Northville Schools. In order to get this Flag 90 to 100% of the student body was required to buy at least one War Stamp or Bond a month.

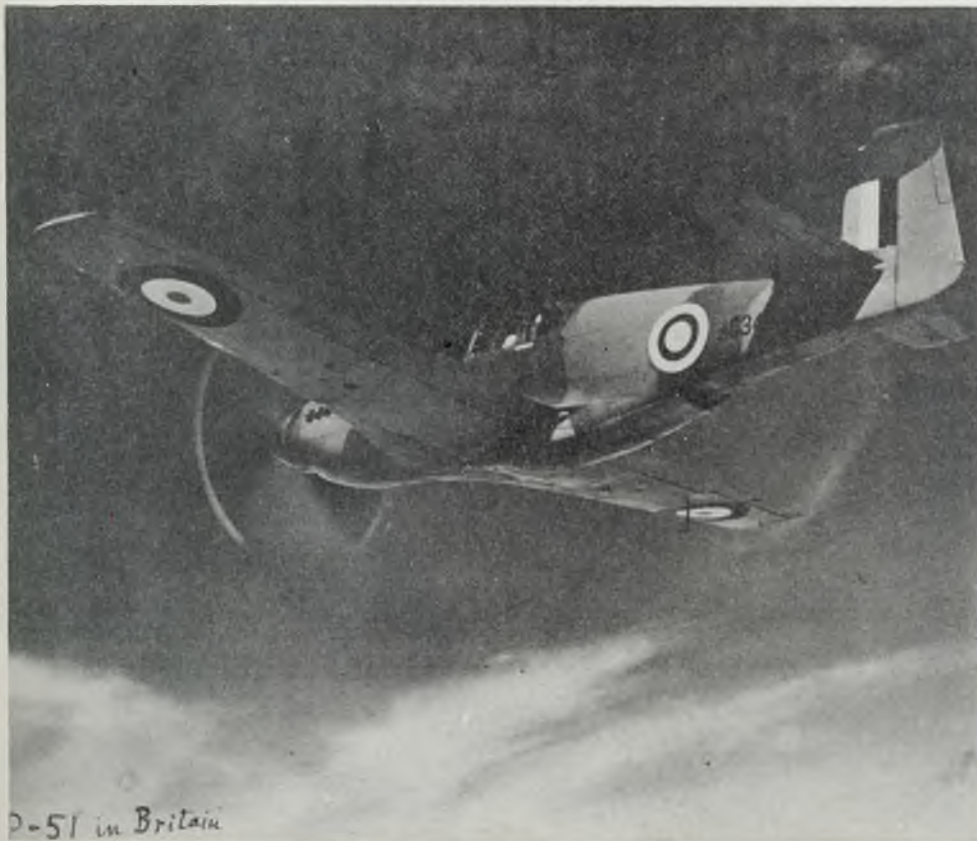

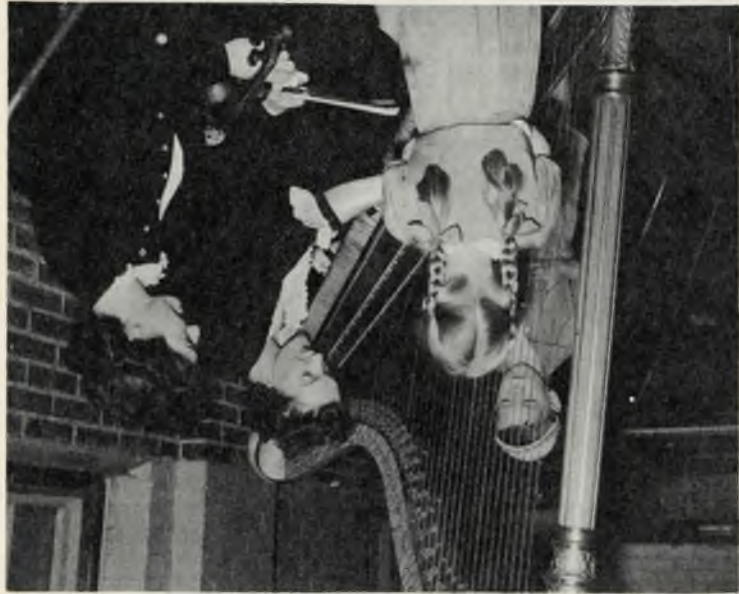
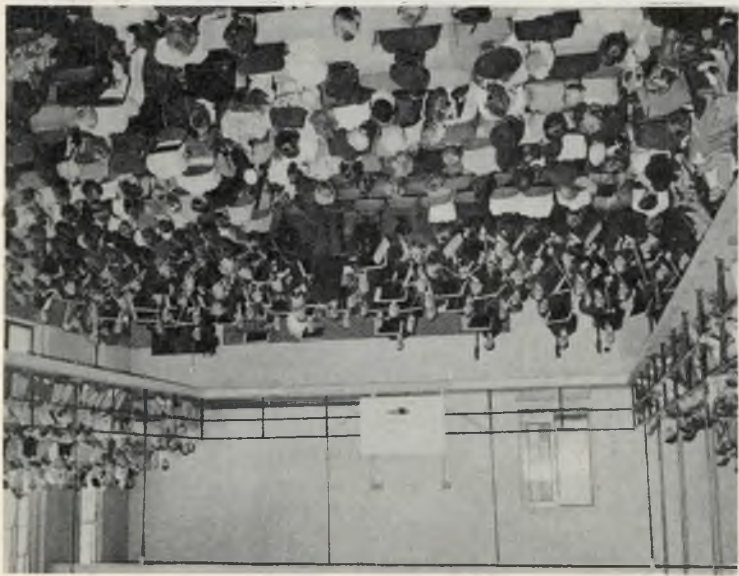
